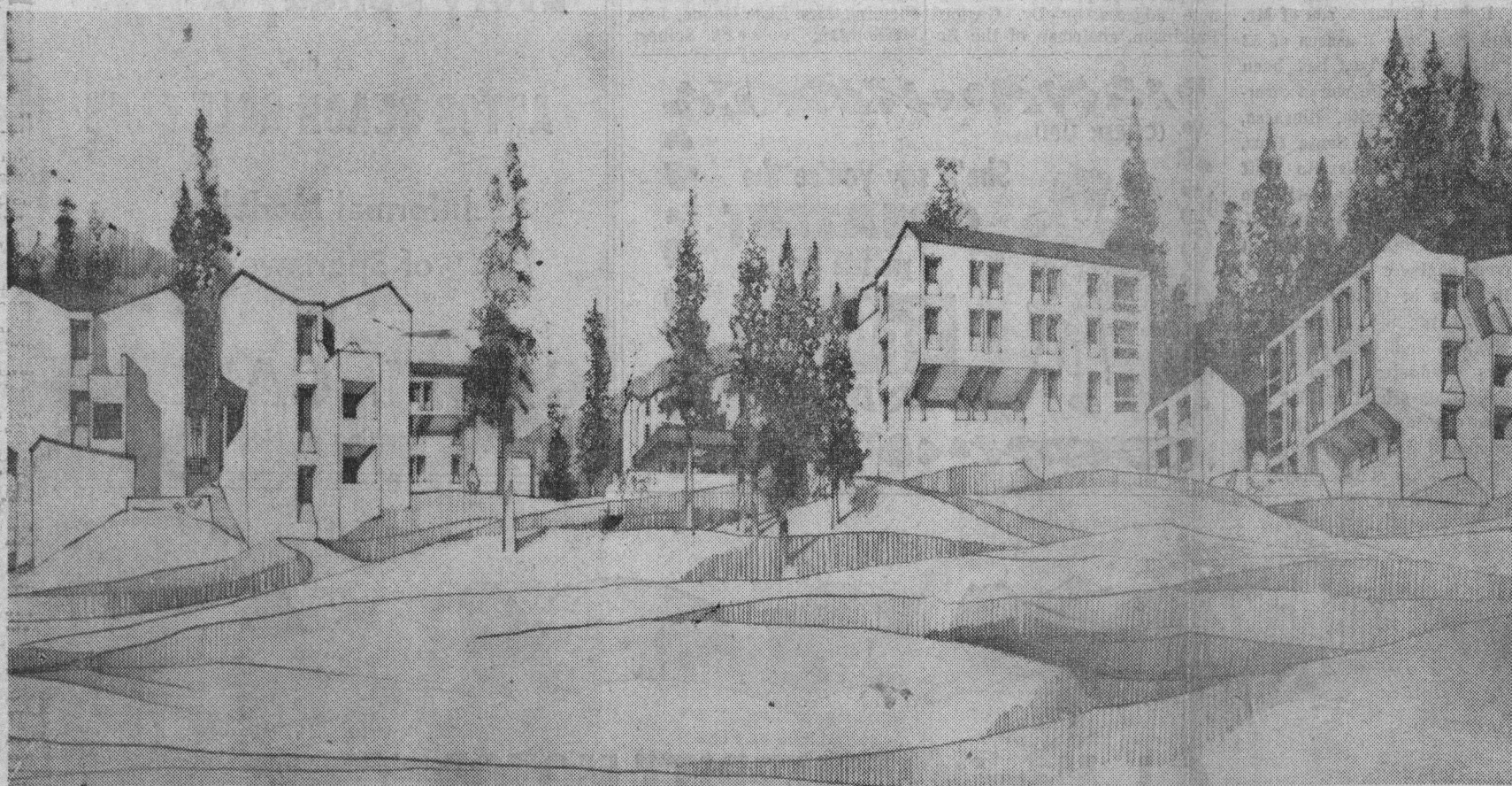

UCSC College III Gets \$500,000 Grant From Crown Zellerbach Foundation



UCSC's College III will be named Crown college, it was announced today by UC president Clark Kerr and UCSC chancellor Dean McHenry.

The Crown Zellerbach Foundation has given the college a \$500,000 grant, which will pay part of the construction costs of the college. Crown college is

scheduled to open in September, 1967.

The grant, McHenry said, "will enable the college to be much more than a collection of dormitories attached to a dining hall and some classrooms. It will be a true small residential coeducational college, with its own library-reading room, conference room, faculty com-

mon room, and with quarters for its provost and a number of its faculty.

Emphasis in Crown college, planned for 525 students, will be on the sciences and mathematics. Kenneth V. Thimann, formerly Higgins professor of biology at Harvard and a noted botanist, is provost of the college.

The architect for Crown college is Ernest Kump Associates. Landscape architect is Laurence Halprin and Associates. Construction will start in April.
