SC Fails Goal For Music Fete

By Len Klempnauer Sentinel Staff Writer The Cabrillo Music festival, termed a "county-wide" event, is not getting county-wide support.

The area lagging is Santa Cruz, according to Rich Hart, college instructor who is administrative director of the 1964 festival.

The festival needs to raise about \$2000 more to meet expenses, Hart said, and that's just about what was estimated to be raised in the Santa Cruz area.

Reporting to the college board of trustees yesterday, Hart said the watsonville area has exceeded its goal of \$2635 by \$386; but the Santa Cruz area is way off its goal of \$8400 by \$2035.

Hart said that probably the Miss California pageant has been responsible for the poor assistance being given to the Cabrillo festival. He said that "culture and pretty girls can go hand-inhand, but not when we're right in back of the pageant."

Trustee Keith Shaffer said that people in the Santa Cruz area consider the festival a Watsonville initiated and oriented event while the people in Watsonville consider the pageant a Santa Cruz initiated and oriented af-

Hart, when asked if the demands placed upon Santa Cruzans to promote the pageant adversely affects their desire to promote the festival, seemed to think that isn't the case. He said the main lack of cooperation in Santa Cruz has been with the people concerned with music who probably aren't involved in the pageant promotion.

Hart told the board that the festival is "making progress" and results "have been encouraging." He said festival officials will keep
