## Pointer child-abuse case an anomaly, report says

The county's handling of the Ruby Pointer child-abuse case was "an anomaly," according to the state Department of Social Services, which has reviewed the county's Child Welfare Services programs.

The county Human Resources Agency came under fire in the case, in which police found Pointer's small children living in filth

and unable to speak due to neglect. Social workers had been aware of the family's problems, but had failed to take action.

The state department released its review, begun in September, this week. It was the first such review since 1986.

The state said it was pleased with the program's attempts to deal with problems in the system that had been identified in light of the Pointer case.

Will Lightbourne, the administrator for the county Human Resources Agency, said the county rated among the top of agencies reviewed by the state this year.

The state also reviewed 32 ele-

ments it considers "essential," related to case documentation and handling, and found the county in compliance with 26 of those. The county will submit to the state plans to correct those problems within 60 days.
