

## Neighborhoods Choose 'Delegates'

# LO General Plan Interest

The LOGPAC (Live Oak General Plan Advisory Committee) meeting Monday night was marked by lively neighborhood caucuses and a presentation during the general meeting to hear a progress report for the Live Oak general plan.

LOGPAC is made up of representatives from seven neighborhoods in the Live Oak unincorporated area of Santa Cruz. Each neighborhood has seven voting members and seven alternates who vote on issues to be recommended for a general plan for Live Oak.

More than 100 Live Oak residents met in their neighborhood groups before Monday's meeting to choose voting representatives and alternates and to become more familiar with what LOGPAC has been doing since its inception in Decem-

ber.

Residents from Neighborhood One, the northern section of the district bordered by Highway 1 and Santa Cruz Gardens, voted in five new delegates and 11 alternates. This neighborhood had two meetings last week and will meet again soon. For more information, call Chairman Ray Dick at 475-2204.

Residents from Neighborhood Two, the Maciel-Rodriguez area bordered by Highway 1 to the north and Capitola Road to the south and by Arana and Rodeo gulches to the west and east, selected Al Locatelli and Helen Heinze as voting representatives, along with seven alternates.

Neighborhood Two will caucus again Monday at 7 p.m. at Live Oak School before the general meeting at 7:30 p.m. For more information, call El-

About 14 people from Neighborhood Three, the Twin Lakes - Harbor area bounded by the yacht harbor and Arana Gulch on the west, Capitola Road to the north and Schwan Lake on the east, elected two new voting representatives and one alternate. About 30 residents from Neighborhood Four, the Brommer Street - 17th Avenue area bordered by Capitola Road to the north and the railroad to the south and 17th Avenue and Rodeo Gulch to the west and east, chose three voting representatives. For more information, call Bob Francis at 476-5449.

A group of about eight residents from Neighborhood Five,

east Live Oak bordered by Highway 1 to the north and the railroad to the south and Rodeo Gulch and Soquel Creek to the west and east, met with Chairman George Jercich.
