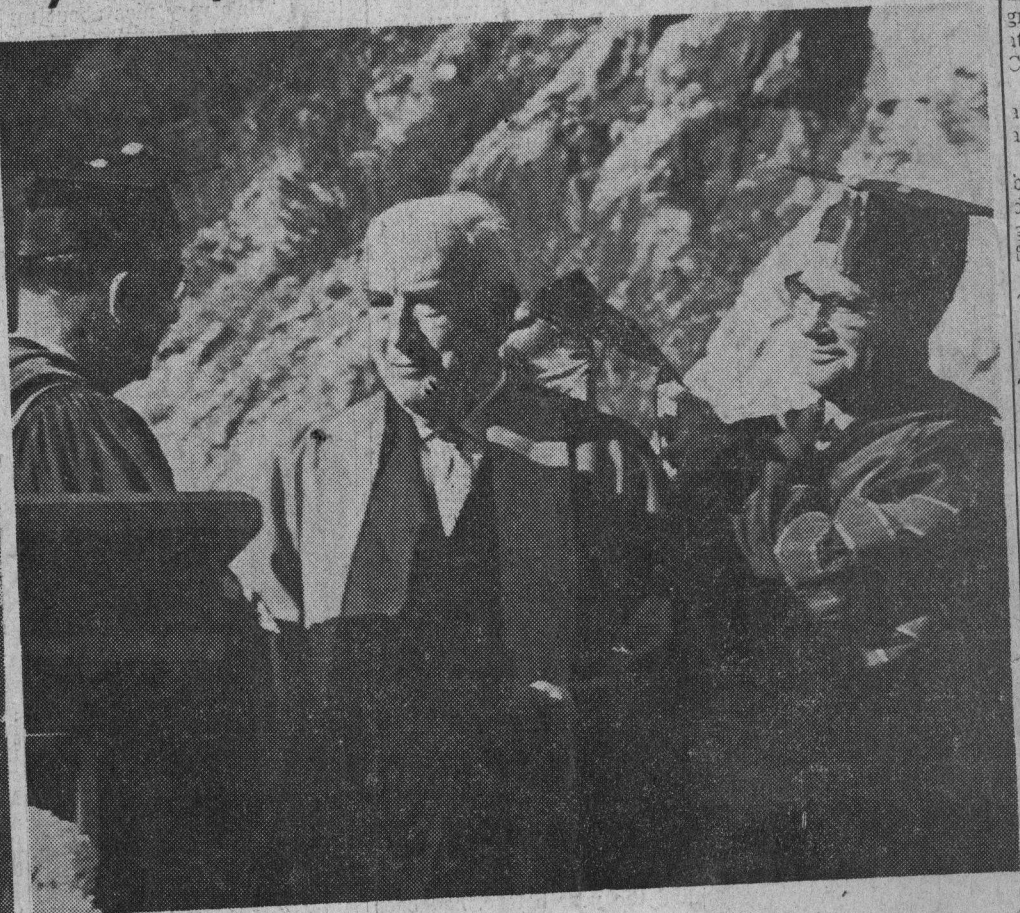
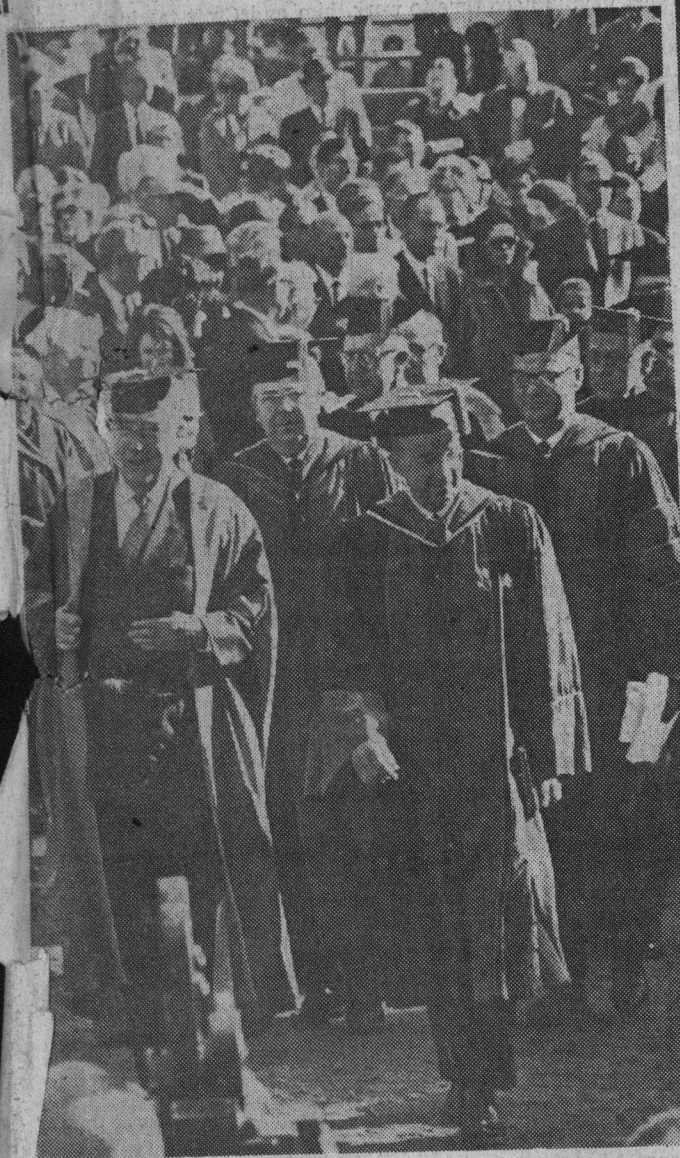


# More Charter Day Happenings At UCSC
