

SANTA CRUZ - Shadrack Kosgei knew he had won.

But he was the only one.


In the best finish in the Wharf to Wharf's 32-year history, the 19-yearold Kenyan edged his countryman Wilson Kigen at the tape after an all-out sprint down the hill into Capitola.

Kosgei and Kigen shared the top time of 27 minutes, 51 seconds.

Wilson Komen was third at 27:55, giving the gold, silver and bronze to the Kenyans. The race was won by a Kenyan for the eighth consecutive year.

For the fourth consecutive year Brett Gotcher of Aptos was the top Santa Cruz County finisher, this year in seventh place at 28:54. Gotcher's

SANTA CRUZ — It came down to the final 400 yards. To repeat as the












CLOCKWISE FROM TOP:

Fitchen-Young snatched back that confidence in a big way Sunday. She overtook Busienei in the final 200 yards to win the 6-mile race and its \$3,000 prize in 32 minutes, 12 seconds and banish the demons of doubt that had begun to haunt her running.

Busienei arrived at the finish 6 seconds later for the \$2,000 prize, while Nicole Kulikov of Fort Collins, Colo., took third in 32:41 for

"It was like a little something magical happened, and I pulled through," said Fitchen-Young, 36, who finished 32nd overall. "I felt pushed by all the momentum and everyone cheering for me the whole race.'

It had been a rough summer for Fitchen-Young. Twice she had qualified for the United States Olympic Trials — in the 10,000 meters and the marathon — and she had realistic expectations of qualifying for Athens in both. Instead, her body balked in both races, leaving her to finish a disappointing 92nd and 17th, respectively.

Those performances had taken such a mental toll on Fitchen-Young that she'd considered not even trying to defend the title she won in 2003 in 31:19.

"I had my doubts about even running today," she said. "I thought, I don't want to come out here and run (poorly) on my home

But she was also unwilling to take the "cowardly" way out, she said. So Sunday, she lined

up in front of the Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk alongside the other elite runners, three of whom had also qualified for the U.S. Olympic marathon trials.

From the start it became obvious that Fitchen-Young would be chasing down the Kenyans, Busienei, 18, and Agnes Ngunjiri, 28, latched onto the men's group and covered the first mile in a swift 4:51. But between miles 4 and 5, Ngunjiri began experiencing pain in her hamstring and slowed, giving Fitchen-Young and a few other athletes a chance to pass her.

"I was not happy with my performance." said Ngunjiri, who ended up fifth. "I got a muscle pull in the last mile and couldn't run."

> Fitchen-Young learned from the crowd that she was sitting in second place. Unable to pick out another woman in the runners ahead of her, she began to resign herself to finishing second.

Then Fitchen-Young reached the crest of the hill that plunges to the finish line in Capitola. At that very spot last year her husband. Paul Young, had assured her she had the race won. He was there again this year, but this time he had advice to give. The petite Busienei was about a block away, and he told the 5-foot-8 Fitchen-Young that if she strided out down the hill, she could win.

"I've got long legs and I can use that when I go down hill," Fitchen-Young said. "If it wasn't for that - I motored."

She pulled even with Busienei with 200 yards to go, and was surprised when the young runner didn't battle her for the win.

"The last mile I picked up," said Busienei, who on her first visit to the United States. She then made a motion to show her efforts were to no avail.

Still worried that either Busienei or the demons might catch her, however, Fitchen-Young managed only a thumbs up when she crossed the tape.

Her confident smile broke out a few steps later.

"I want to go for the three-peat now," she

Stanford teammate Seth Hejny was the top American finisher, in fourth place, but no threat to the Kenvans.

Kosgei is a well-traveled 19-year-old. Ranked No. 84 in the world road race ranking, and rising, he has competed throughout the United States the past two years, and has traveled regularly back and forth to his African homeland.

But Kosgei says he loves the frequent-flyer lifestyle and that Santa Cruz suits him as well as anyplace he has seen.

"I'm really enjoying this, especially Santa Cruz. This is my favorite place," Kosgei said.

His race preparation included an evening at the Boardwalk Saturday. Host Mari Henderson said she'd be taking him surfing after the race, although Kosgei wasn't so sure.

Henderson was in the crowd that gathered to watch the amazing finish at Capitola.

"It was awesome. We were yelling our heads off," Henderson said.

Race director Kirby Nicol called it historic. "That was the closest finish we've ever had. We've had one-two before, but never that close," Nicol said.

It took discussion among race officials before Kosgei was informed he was the race winner, but he knew.

"Crossing the tape, I could see," Kosgei said, then made a generous measurement. "I was a half meter ahead."

The runners were more than a minute off the course record of 26:42, set in 1992 by Lameck Aguta. They ran the first mile in 4:36 and the second at 4:40. That's where Gotcher fell off the pace, about the same point as last year, when he finished third.

Former Olympian Nick Rogers hung on for another mile, and Hejny reached the 4-mile mark before the Kenyans pulled away.

"Going out that first mile felt like sprinting and they looked like they were jogging," Gotch-

Gotcher convinced Hejny to join the race for the first time. They ran the course together Saturday in preparation. Hejny recently graduated from Stanford, and wouldn't have minded picking up his first paycheck, if he'd been able to hold on and make a move for the \$1,000 third-place prize.

'We tried to stay with the three Kenyans as long as we could," Hejny said. "You could tell, there were certain points in the race where

they'd make a move and a few more people would drop back. After a while I was the last one hanging on."

Runner-up Kigen is ranked No. 33 in the world, and aspires to make the prestigious Kenyan national team. Seventy-three of the top 100 road racers in the world are Kenyan.

Kigen grew up in Kenya, running five miles to school every day. He said some of the money would be sent home to help his family. He liked the course, the competition and especially the music along the route.

"It was motivating me a lot," Kigen said. Gotcher and Hejny kept an eye on the mile times early in the race. Kigen said he doesn't wear a watch or worry much about the pace. "It's more of a feel," said Kigen. "We start-

ed slowly, and along the way I tried to push

That's when the competitors started falling

Gotcher said he expects to be back every year to take his shot. "I love it. It's the highlight of my summer,"
