

The building of 1868 was on a lot bought from John Dreher for \$900. Contract for construction was let to D. C. Fargo for \$1600. A special tax of \$2500 had been voted to cover.

Its first teachers were Lizzie Mc-Cullom and May Cooper. It was known as "the beach school" as distinguished from "the hill school."

The "beach school" was the third one in Santa Cruz. A one-room building had been erected three years earlier as the Grant school, financed by a separate district which in 1869 combined with Santa Cruz. The original Branciforte school building, on the site now that of the Santa Cruz hospital, was constructed in 1869.
