Handicapped Children Aided By Marri-Eds Benefit Dance

August will be an exciting month for some 220 crippled children who will be brought from 26 northern California counties for three weeks of camping in the Santa Cruz mountains near Boulder Creek.

Sponsord by the Santa Cruz County Council Crippled Children's society, the camp for many years has given outdoor therapy to nearly a thousand crippled

children.

One of the biggest organiza-tional boosters of the camp is the Marri-Eds club of Santa Cruz. As a result of eight benefit dances in the past, this group of 60 young married women has donated more than \$11,855 to "Camp Campbell," which is located north of Boulder Creek near Highway 9.

On the evening of April 6 the Marri-Eds will again present their benefit dance in the Cocoanut Grove. Karl Bruhn's orchestra will furnish the music. Admission

is \$1.

Teddy Nadler Wins Another \$32,000

New York (A) .- Theodore Nadler, civil service clerk from St. Louis, won \$32,000 on a television quiz show last night by defeating a university professor on Civil War questions.

It boosted Nadler's overall winnings on the CBS show, "The \$64,000 Challenge," to \$120,000. His opponent was Austin Ranney, a professor of political science at

the University of Illinois. Each contestant was asked a six-part question dealing with battles in the Civil War. Ranney

The camp will be operated in two sections. Six to 10-year-olds will attend from the 10th through the 16th of August. Those from 11 to 15 will attend from August 18 to September 1.

During their stay the children are given instruction in archery, tether ball, swimming, fishing, boating, handicrafts, and nature

Those who are able, go on hikes and play wheelchair base-ball. There will be picnics and games during the day. In the evenings the kids are treated to movies, folk dancing and singing around the campfire.

Taking care of these children require special attention.

A staff of 70 persons, mostly college students, and two special nurses on 24-hour duty, is required to operate the camp.

Camp director this year will again be Michael O'Gara, formerly employed by the Santa Clara school system as director of outdoor education.

From 1942 to 1952 he was supervisor of physical education at UCLA and a boxing coach at the university.

After leaving the university he undertook a series of positions setting up crippled childrens' summer camps in Los Angeles

county and in Ohio.

Tickets for the Marri-Eds dance are available from any member or at the Cocoanut Grove. Mrs. Gerkensmeyer is general chairman.
