Another 'Trailside' victim found here

Investigators' worst fears were realized late Monday afternoon when the skull fragments and jawbone descovered in Castle Rock State Park near the Santa Cruz County border were positively identified as positively identified as belonging to Anna Kelly Menjivar, an acquaintance of trailside suspect David J. Carpenter.

Miss Menjivar, been reported missing from her Daly City home since Dec. 28. An investigator with the homicide division of the Daly City police said today that Carpenter's name "has not been eliminated" from the list of suspects in that case, but he was reluctant to discuss much about the investigation because of a gag order, prohibiting officials, detec-

Only a few bone and skull fragments, and pieces of clothing from a young female, have been found in the area. So far the remains have not turned up a clue as to time or cause of death. More pathological investigation will be con-ducted today to determine those factors, but detectives were not optimistic about the outcome of that
