



## "The Heart of the Santa Cruz Mountains"

Concrete highways bring the primeval forest stands of the San Lorenzo closer to the metropolitan areas of northern California than any other area of Big Trees.

In an hour and a half, from San Francisco, without crossing bridge or ferry, the motorist can reach the picturesque tree-clad valley where miles of sparkling streams make a region of enchanting beauty.

No. 5, coming down the Skyline Boulevard from San Francisco, becomes No. 9 to traverse the length of the valley. No. 17, through Los Gatos, gives access by the cut-off at Camp Evers, seven miles north of Santa Cruz, through Mount Hermon to Felton. Travelers from the south, on No. 101, enter the valley at Santa Cruz. Many cottages and resorts of every kind are available.

By state arterial routes and county roads the motorist may make countless short trips to visit the State Redwood Park in Big Basin, the county-owned Big Tree Grove, to find countless shady drives or take a cooling trip over Ben Lomond Mountain to the ocean.
