What still lives for Evergreen buffs are the pictures of a pioneer era turned Victorian—the town that could produce a Judge Logan (who produced the Loganberry), philanthropist ex-slave Loudon Nelson, and other persons of note and not-note.

STATEMENT OF ABANDONMENT OF USE OF FICTITIOUS BUSINESS NAME

The following person has abandoned the use of the fictitious business name RENEE'S FASHIONS at 137 River Street South, Santa Cruz, California.

The fictitious business name

"We have only memories, spellbinding tales of the past, and a pride in our Santa Cruz heritage to share," said A.B. (Renie) Leaman, the volunteer director of a group of Evergreen supporters called HELP (Help Evergreen Live Permanently).

HELP was organized in 1974 to keep these memories alive by keeping the cemetery restored.

It's a project to "weave together the threads of our common local history and heritage."

A child, Julia Arcan, died July 19, 1850, and was the first known person to be buried there.

There were only 20 families—about 400 people—in the small town by the sea. Julia's parents were believed to have given the name "Death Valley" to that terrible stretch of desert in Southern California where they were stranded three months on their way to Santa Cruz.

Neglect showed in the years when people had little concern for history. Tombstones toppled over from time and vandals; poison oak and weeds invaded the place, and rubbish piled up.

But a few years ago, pride came to the fore. Two years ago, the county, with federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act funding, hired

a maintenance person and restorer. Now there are two, plus six young people in the Youth Employment Training Program working there.

The Santa Cruz Parks and Recreation Department also helps, and the work at the eight-acre cemetery resembles an archeological "dig" as slipping hillsides of mud and brush are cleared away, uncovering burial plots, brick walls and pathways.

Biographies of more than 250 early residents have been catalogued, and now Mrs. Leaman lectures on Evergreen's history to schoolchildren. About 3,000 have heard tales of the past there.

Evergreen has been designated a point of historical interest by the state of California, and HELP is striving to have it entered in the National Register of Historic Places.

HELP is organized under the umbrella of the Santa Cruz Historical Society, and any contributions are tax-deductible. An annual fundraiser is set for Aug. 26-27 at the Civic Auditorium.
