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Board Refers Juvenile Hall Site Study To Planners

Another look at the Graham Hill road site for a juvenile hall — this time by county planning commissioners — was ordered last night by the county board of supervisors after an emotion-packed hearing.

Board members unanimously backed San Lorenzo Supervisor Vincent Locatelli's motion "to go ahead with purchase of the site and refer it to the planning commission for a report by December 14."

Despite cries of "they've sold us down the river," and "it was fixed from the start" from persons among the standing-room only crowd of objectors supervisors did not make a final decision on choosing the 38-acre Graham Hill property.

Soquel Supervisor Tom Black had first said he wanted the planning commission to consider at least three possible sites: the Graham Hill property, land "anywhere" in in DeLaveaga park, and the Shaffer property near the Walti-Schilling plant in west Santa Cruz.

Supervisor Robert Burton said he wanted to see more

studies of the county's Holohan road location near Watsonville, but added that "we have gone over this until we are weary. I am willing to go along with the majority opinion."

Chairman Russ McCallie, who was away on a week's vacation, has said he favors sites other than the Graham Hill one.

More than 130 persons crowded the city council chambers for the evening hearing, and the vast majority made it plain they were against the construction of a juvenile hall on Graham Hill road. They were backed by petitions containing more than 700 signatures of opponents from Boulder Creek to Bonny Doon.

There were only a handful of supporters, most of them from the county juvenile justice commission or the board of public welfare.

Many of the opponents were from the Pasatiempo Pines area near the 38-acre Cowell property, and they cited a long list of reasons why the land was not the right location for a hall.

John Biondi, president of the Pasatiempo Pines Improvement association, developer Howard

Dysle, the Rev. William Vickery of 132 Caseta way and O. D. Jones of 152 Caseta way received outbursts of applause after declaring they are not against juvenile halls but are against the location.

"We need a juvenile hall. We believe in juvenile halls, and we voted for the bond issue for the hall," Biondi said. But he added that "this is not located near the county's center of population, and Watsonville should be considered here. The police departments agree it would be located too far out."

Jones added that Santa Cruz Police Chief Geno Pini said it "would cost \$130,000 over 10 years in additional travel distance to Graham Hill."

Dysle hit heavily at the site from the viewpoint that county planning commissioners have had no opportunity to look into the matter. He noted that three possible sites nearer town on north Ocean street were turned down because of protests, and said "we've got two or three times the amount of signatures against this site." He added that "condemnation (of another site) takes less time than planning

a new road through the site to the valley."

County public works director Warren Harrison had said in a letter to the board that part of the Cowell property must be purchased for a new road alignment.

Largest round of applause went to Vickery, who liberally praised the work of the juvenile justice commission. But he added, "It is clear that the Cowell site is not the most feasible place to build a hall. The needs of the whole county ought to be considered."

When Black suggested that another location in DeLaveaga park should be considered, Burton noted that "if you did that, you wouldn't have one subdivision against this, you would have a whole city."

Silliman cautioned Black that "the controversial aspects of this would delay it meeting after meeting. And I believe the planning commission wouldn't like to wash the board's dirty linen."

Locatelli moved to confine the planners' study to the Graham Hill site, and was seconded reluctantly by Black. The vote in favor was unanimous.

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
