The corrected time for Jester and Canepa's boat was 10:57.44. Her lapse time was 13:26.54 which means she finished the race at 7:26.54 yesterday morning.

Eight Santa Cruz Yacht club boats sailed. In class A, "Else," owned by Worth Brown and Don Case, was 11th in 11:49.21 corrected time.

Santa Cruz boats finished in a bunch. Next was former mayor Norman Lezin's "West Wind," 12th in 11:51.4. Then came Eric Peterson's "Angelita" in 12:21.34. Fourteenth was "Wayfarer," the third best handicapped boat and only Elkhorn Yacht club representative owned by Marty Franich of Watsonville. Her time was 12:29.27.

Another former mayor, Bert Snyder's "Cortship," was 18th in 12:59.55.

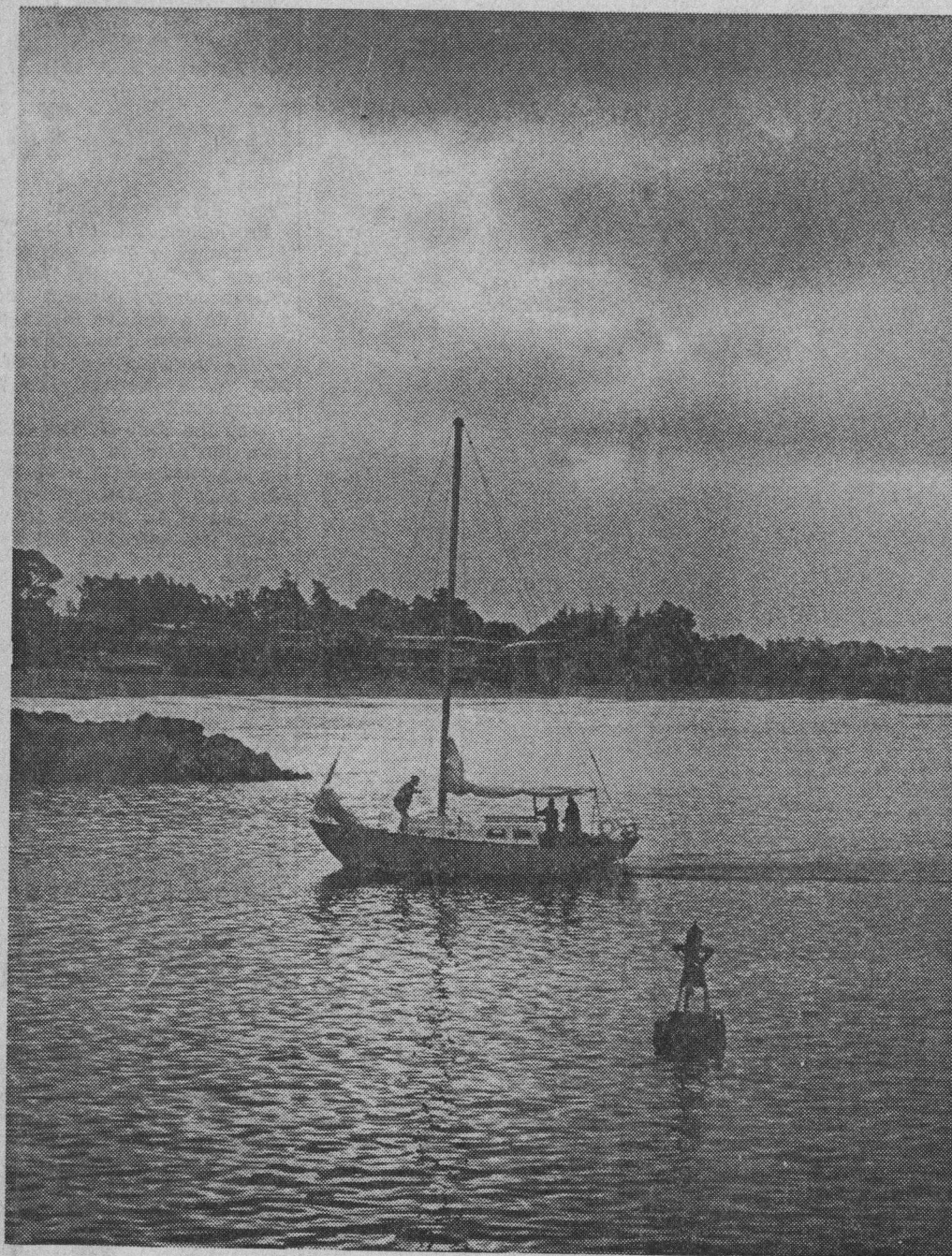
