WILL DALEY ELECTED MAYOR OF CAPITOLA

Will F. Daley, who polled the good largest number of votes in Capi-counc Capi city council election April 8, is Capitola's new mayor.

His unanimous selection by memers of the new council was the bers of the new council was the first order of business last night after the new councilmen had been sworn in by City Clerk J. Raymond Abicht. The city hall was nearly filled with interested citizens.

Daley, a resident of Capitola

Daley, a resident of Capitola since 1948, is a former Wyoming county assessor, district tax com-missioner, abstract and title company executive and newspaper-man. He received 295 votes of man. He received 295 votes at the April 8 election. As mayor, he succeeds Bradley M. Macdonald, a member of the council since incorporation of the city early council since in 1949.

Joseph Tabacchini, one of the two incumbents re-elected, re-ceived 291 votes and with Daley

will serve a four-year term.

S. Clair Ellis the other incumbent re-elected, and Charles L. Dixon and Otto F. Van Buren are the other councilmen and each will serve two-year terms. Dixon polled 238 Van Buren 233; and Elvotes; lis 209

Abicht and John B. Carter, treasurer, were unopposed for re-election. The city clerk was sworn in last night by City Attorney Eu-gene Adams. Carter was sworn in

The old board, which included Mayor Macdonald and Russell B. Tripp, who did not seek re-election, and Elmer S. Andersen, who was sixth in the field of eight candidates for the five posts, canvassed the April 8 election ballot and adopted a resolution declaring the new council and clerk and treasnew council and clerk and treasurer elected.

The final official action of the old board was approval of a resolution concerning construction of a sewage system within the city, to be financed by special assessments and assessment bonds proceedings. The project is necessary as a health measure, the resolution declared. In behalf of many citizens of Capitola, retiring Mayor Macdonald

was presented with a beautiful in-scribed ring by John Battistini. scribed Macdonald was given a rhine-

one pin. Macdonald said it had been distinct pleasure to serve on the council for four years and he add-ed that "incorporation of our city worked out well, far better than first anticipated."

"The city stood by its promise of no property tax within the city," he said, but added a warning note that "if the people demand more and more services, some kind of a tax will be necessary, possibly a sales tax."

Daley said he was gratified by the large turnout at the session and expressed hope that Capitola citizens will continue to be present at the sessions. "It shows interest upon the part of our people and is encouraging to the council," new mayor said.

He also stated that "it been planned to have Joe Tabacchini, the old warhorse who has done so much for Capitola, in this chair, but he declined due to personal business reasons."

Mayor Daley appealed for cooperation from the city's citizens.
"All requests will be given consideration but we cannot grant all
requests because of limited capital. We will try to make every
dollar go as far as possible and
see that it is well spent."
