The capacity crowd at the Civic Auditorium didn't seem too surprised at the judges' ultimate choice since Miss Fogarty had sent chills through the audience with her strong rendition of "Willkommen" and "Cabaret" from the musical, "Cabaret."

Her five-foot, six-and-a-half-inch, 112-pound figure already had been recognized Thursday when she was the swim suit winner during the first night of the three-day competition.

But another thing that got the new Miss California her crown was her warm and genuine personality that was evident the minute her name was announced.

Without losing her composure, Miss Fogarty just smiled, waved and repeatedly thanked the cheering crowd. Then, she leaned over and hugged her fellow contestants.

But the night eventually ended up belonging to Deanna Rae Fogarty who may have reached her stated goal: "I want to develop mystelf one hundred percent so that I can reach the unreachable star."
