Removing the Old Landmarks

The removal of some of the very oldest landmarks in the city has been on during the last few months, to hake room for newer and more modern houses.

The residences include the tearing down of the old Lewis Hihn residence on Locust St., built in the sixties. This will be replaced by a modern bungalow; and the Ennor house, put up on a part of the Hihn lot in the seventies, is being dismantled by Charles W. Stone.

On Front St. the old Dreher residence, constructed in the seventies, was removed, to be replaced by a concrete building for C. P. Clark, now occupied by Childer's feed store. Across the street is a Walti house which was also built in the sixties and is being torn down to make way for the new Kerrick laundry.

One of the oldest buildings on the avenue had to give way for the new

Santa Cruz theater.

There are a number of buildings, erected in the old mission town of Santa Cruz before the Civil War, and if not kept up they should be razed to the earth. The material in them is worth something in this season of costly lumber, etc.
