

# Sculpture Honors Late SV Woman

A large bronze abstract sculpture was lowered into a pool at Cowell college on the UCSC campus Saturday, to serve as a fountainpiece in memory of the last local descendent of the founders of Scotts Valley, Edna L. Scott.

The eight-foot fountain in the college plaza will be dedicated Saturday.

Berkeley painter and sculptress Nancy Glenn, who spent two years creating the fountain bronze, will have a concurrent exhibition of paintings shown that day and through November 13 at the college.

Two donors, who asked to remain anonymous, commissioned the sculpture.

Miss Scott, daughter of Joseph and Annie Scott, was the last descendent of the pioneer family to bear the Scott name. She lived at 124 Walnut avenue until her death. She taught the fourth grade in Mission Hill Elementary schools for many years.

Nancy Genn, an internationally known artist, worked in close collaboration with Cowell college architects Wurster, Bernardi & Emmons, and landscape architects Halprin and Associates, in designing the fountainpiece.

Water will flow from the many "arms" and projections on the sculpture into the pool below.

Mrs. Genn's works are included in private collections in the United States, France, Italy, and New Zealand. She has had many one-man shows, including San Francisco's De Young Museum, Museum of Art, and Gump's Gallery, and The New School in New York.

In addition to the sculpture for the Cowell college plaza, Mrs. Genn's recent commissions for cast bronze include a sculpture for the lobby wall of Pine Terrace, San Francisco, and appointments for the First Unitarian church of Berkeley.

## Army Reserve, NG Continue To Enlist Men At Rapid Pace

Washington (AP) — Barring a major change in Pentagon policy, the national guard and army reserve will continue this fiscal year to induct enlistees at a faster rate than they can be trained, figures showed today.

The Reserve units, which had 133,000 untrained men on hand last June 30, the end of fiscal

tion and training levels, will be faced with a backlog of more than 150,000 men — enlistees who are untrained — by the end of this fiscal year June 30.
