An Old Fort Town For Scotts Valley

An old-fashioned fort town called Fort Scott-Pinnacle Pass will open Memorial Day in Scotts Valley off Mt. Hermon Road.

Town will feature daytime entertainment for families and night entertainment for adults.

The town will be composed of old buildings designed by artist Ron Scofield to be perfect replicas of those found in a fort town of bygone days. Each store will feature special merchandise. A highlight will be the Cattleman's Inn, a westernstyle restaurant that will offer two-pound steak dinners.

Also featured will be Scotts Valley's oldest building, The Bunkhouse, which was built in 1859, and Foy's Ice Cream Parlor, which will serve old-fash-

ioned ice cream.

The completed Phase 1 development will include a picnic area and a bridge from which

children may fish.

In its Phase 2 Development, Fort Scott-Pinnacle Pass will introduce an oldtime Melodrama Theater. At the same time a sheriff's office and a bank will be opened to provide the setting for such western action as the pursuit of bank robbers by a sheriff's posse.
