

## Aircraft take to the skies

## Old favorite, new dems appear at Watsonville Fly-In & Air Show

They arrived in droves Friday, a patchwork armada of aircraft ranging from hand-made, singleseat propeller-driven planes to gargantuan military transport planes whose tails tower above the tarmac

The 47th annual Watsonville Fly-In & Air Show will feature many old favorites, such as the U.S. Air Force C-17 Globemaster III. At 174 feet long and boasting a wingspan of more than 160 feet, the plane is the largest plane ever to land at the airport.

The airshow will also feature aerobatic performers such as Vicky Benzing, Eddie Andreini and Tim Decker.

But attendees will also find new aircraft sitting on the tarmac and flying through the air.

Eric Preston of Sonoma will be showing off a plane he built as a replica of a Bleriot XI, the first plane to cross the Atlantic. Nothing more than a metal frame covered by wood and fabric, the simple airplane is contrasted by the contemporary models sitting nearby.

Preston said he built the plane in 29 days with the help of his wife and two sons.

Finding planes such as the replica Bleriot is exactly the point of coming to airshows for Chester Davis, who recently moved to the area from St. Louis.

"You almost always see something new," he said.

Davis said he prefers the "warbirds," a term for aircraft that were flown during World War II.

A member of the St. Louis wing of the Commemorative Air Force, Davis said he appreciates the history represented by restored and preserved planes.

"That's what the Commemorative Air Force is all about," he said.
