Clean-Up Crews Gain On Fish

Cautious optimism was the word at the Santa Cruz harbor this morning. Port district employes said the massive inflow of dead anchovies — more than 50 million so far - appears to have stopped, so far — appears to have stopped, and disposal squads apparently are gaining rapidly on the heaps of fish in the harbor.

But the word from state officials is that the massive die-off of anchovies will continue until

either wind or weather changes, to change water conditions pro-ducing the fish-killing red tides. No one is ready just yet to say the change has come.

Despite today's gains, the dead fish smell is increasing in the vicinity of the harbor. Many of the remaining fish are badly decomposed, coating the harbor with a layer of brownish scales and adding to the pervasive smell.

Port district, city, county and public health officials met at the port office this morning to discuss means of handling the remaining fish. Meanwhile, crews and equipment from city and county are pumping out the fish, along with harbor crews and employes from septic tank companies hired by the port district,.

Two boats are netting dead fish and carrying them 10 to 15 miles out into the bay, where they should disintegrate before they should disinteg reaching shore again.
