

The County's Newest Reference Book

An indexed CEMETERY RECORDS OF SANTA CRUZ COUNTY is the newest book concerning county history, to appear. It came out this week, published by County Bank, for the Genealogical Society of Santa Cruz County which did the work.

It took the hard-working members of the Genealogical society, under the direction of project chairman Sara Bunnett, more than two years to compile and type the material for the 264-page book.

It will be available to interested persons at the society's office at Branciforte Public Library, 230 Gault Street, Santa Cruz.

Included are Boulder Creek, Felton, Home of Peace, Evergreen, Holy Cross, Oakwood, Soquel IOOF, Santa Cruz IOOF, Mt. Carmel and the Day Family Cemeteries. Records date from the beginning to 1940, the cut-off date.

The Watsonville Cemetery was omitted, having already been recorded by another organization.

Small family burying grounds mentioned in-

clude China Grade, Martin's in Glenwood, Grateful Mountain at Rancho del Oso, Last Chance Road, Ord Ranch, Paul Sweet place, Waddell Beach parking lot, Valencia and Gianoni-McCrary Ranch.

Proceeds from sale of the book will be put into a special fund to be used for future projects not yet determined, according to Sara. Price is \$8, and \$9 if mailed.

The idea for the cemetery index actually was suggested to the local society by Sara on her return from a trip to England where she researched the Bunnett family history.

"I felt it would be a tremendous boon to family history researchers who are not able to travel as extensively as necessary to trace their family roots," she explained.

It was decided by society members, that since there is so much migration into California, the project most useful would be an index of cemeteries.

Sara was asked by the then president, Mildred

Sidner, to head the task force of member-researchers.

Tens of members visited cemeteries to copy data from tombstones, other teams visited cemetery offices to check records, still others indexed, typed and collated.

The book represents a tremendous amount of research and compilation. However, as in any work of this magnitude, there are inadvertent gaps which will be rectified in future editions. So far, about 200 books have been printed.

"By way of an aside," notes Sara, "this indexing work revealed Santa Cruz to us as it really was. The index isn't just names and dates of birth and burial. It's about real people and we learned that many problems we tend to think of as recent, are problems that have always been with us. Alcoholism for example — 100 years ago it was a not uncommon cause of death."

Some of the work made necessary trips to the


Monterey Diocese Chancery Office to translate the old Spanish language records.





