One middle-aged man became so incensed by the flag that he charged the group surrounding the flagpole at the end of the rally and attempted to drag it down. Plainclothes police separated him from the crowd and let him go.

An officer at the scene criticized the man's gesture. "People like that roar in like a bull, get something started, and then stand off on the sidelines to watch the action," the offi-
