Saigon, Viet Nam (P) - Clubswinging troops today rushed into a high school and arrested 750 jeering schoolboys who defied President Ngo Dinh Diem's government by barricading their school and going on strike.

The military governor of Saigon warned pupils and their parents stern measures will be tak-

en to quell the unrest.

In a communique, Brig. Gen. Ton That Dinh said male demonstrators over 20 years of age would be drafted into the army and students of both sexes under 20 would be sent to special "reeducation centers."
