bookstore industry has taken a hit in the last decade due to the rise of online retailers, with Capitola Book Cafe being the latest casualty in Santa Cruz County, Pleskunas points to the sense of community that contributes immensely to Crossroads Books' steady business.

Crossroads Books is not only the lone bookstore in Watsonville, but it is the only one in the south and mid-county areas.

Pleskunas is able to order books overnight, and unlike purchasing online, the store doesn't charge for shipping, which often drives up the price for a book bought on the Internet.

The 2,400-square-foot store features a large selection of children's books, as well as sections for local authors and books written in Spanish, among others.

Cynthia Newberry dropped by Crossroads Books Tuesday to pick up her ordered copy of Alan Bradley's latest novel, "The Weed that Strings the Hangman's Bag."

"I love this bookstore because I like shopping locally," said Newberry, who has been coming to Crossroads Books for the past 15 years. "I can get just about everything I need here. Kelly is so nice and always helpful. And she can get me

books faster than Amazon and at the same price or, sometimes, cheaper."

Crossroads Books' staff consists of one employee, Tess Felder, who Pleskunas described as "very knowledgeable and can always find a book or offer up a good suggestion."

She also has one volunteer. Alice Weigel, who has helped for three years call customers and shelves books.

Pleskunas purchased the business in 2010 from Jan and Paula van Waardenberg, a decision she said was driven by her love of books and having worked at the store for a number of years.

While she was cautious of making large changes to the business, she did decide to offer more gift items and goods made
