
Falling Trees, High Water Ruined Homes In The Valley

Creek was a victim indirectly of the flood. The water toppled


a giant fir and the fir nearly cut the home in two. No casualty was reported.




Jack Miller's Ben Lomond courts is now a sea of mud and wreekage. Three cabins were re-

many houses like this one along the river that probably are damaged but still unreported.



crashing across the river all but severing the summer home of Claire H. Bona, in the Wild-


wood section, above Boulder Creek. Inspecting the damage is Pete Piccioni.
