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Harbor Gets Clean Bill Of Health

The Santa Cruz small craft harbor received an official clean bill of health this morning.

Divers from the state fish and game department reported that there is no hydrogen sulfide in harbor water, and reported oxygen levels back to normal. The report means that the last damaging traces of the summer's giant anchovy die-off in the harbor are gone.

Bill Casper, operator of the marine repair shops, reported that metal parts are now retaining normal brilliance in harbor water. Since the fish kill, metal fittings and painted boat hulls have been discolored by the hydrogen sulfide.

The divers, who made extensive tests today, were Howard Martin, game warden for region 3, and Michael Johnson, fishery biologist for the fish and game department.

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
