Thousands flocked to Capitola Village last weekend to watch skateboarders barrel down Monterey Avenue and artists create fleeting images in the sand.

John Hutson of Santa Cruz won the skateboard contest for the second year in a row, with a time of 26.593 seconds. He went home

with a \$600 cash prize.

Christopher and Kelley Desmet of San Jose were the Grand Sweepstakes winners in the Sandsculpture contest and the Banks family of Oakland received the Director's

trophy for their entry "Parade Rest."

The 29th edition of the Capitola National Begonia Festival concludes this weekend with two major events — the world-famous Nautical Parade on Sunday, and the Capi-

tola Beach Festival Saturday. More than 15,000 spectators are expected to jam themselves into Capitola Village Sunday to watch 15 begonia-bedecked floats parade down Soquel Creek.

Parade time is 2 p.m. but spectators should come early as parking will be at a premium.

Free shuttle buses will be running from the Bay Avenue area into the village before

and after the parade.

Other parking is available in easy walking distance off Cliff Drive and at the Jade Street Park at 47th Avenue.

Some of the volunteers will start building their floats Friday night and float building will be underway in earnest Saturday afternoon and evening.


Blossoms again this year are being picked at the Brown Bulb Ranch growing




Music before and during the parade will again be provided by the Begonia Cowboys, featuring William Strickland and Dene Davidson of Capitola.

The Capitola Junior Lifeguards are again sponsoring the Capitola Beach Festival on Saturday, beginning at 9 a.m. with the Eddie Arco Memorial Paddleboard Race.
