

Big Basin's 100th birthday celebrated with visit from Clint Eastwood

BOULDER CREEK - Big Basin Redwoods State Park kicked off its 100th birthday celebration Saturday with a visit from a big star, who was just named California's newest state parks commissioner.

Beneath a canopy of redwoods in the park's amphitheater, Clint Eastwood briefly revived his role as "Dirty Harry," flipping open his new state parks ID and telling the crowd: "You're all under arrest.'

Saturday's swearing-in of Eastwood was the first event in 100 days of special activities planned at Big Basin, California's oldest state park.

The theme of the centennial celebration includes the power of people in the conservation and parks movement. The effort to protect the Santa Cruz Mountains from logging culminated in the creation of Big Basin as a state park in 1902, and eventually led to statewide efforts to preserve old growth redwood forests.

"I have some wonderful childhood memories of this park, so helping celebrate its centennial is special for me," Eastwood said. "It is a fitting way to begin my term with the State Park and Recreation Commission."

Big Basin encompasses more than 18,000 acres of forest, including redwoods, oak, chaparral and riparian habitats. It is home to the largest continuous stand of ancient coast redwoods south of San Francisco.

The park has 80 miles of hiking trails, linking Big Basin from the eastern edge of the Santa Cruz Mountain range to the ocean.

Family and group camping, tent cabins, backpack camps, hiking, mountain biking and equestrian trails are available year-round.
